U.S. Department of Homeland Security

Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP)

This grant program plays a critical role in implementing the National Preparedness System (NPS) by supporting the development, maintenance, and delivery of core capabilities essential to achieving the National Preparedness Goal of a secure and resilient nation. Achieving core capabilities requires a collective effort from the entire community, beyond the capabilities of any single organization or government level. The HSGP's allowable costs support efforts to build and sustain core capabilities across the department's prevention, protection, mitigation, response, and recovery mission areas, including the following priorities:

- Building and sustaining law enforcement terrorism prevention capabilities;
- Maturation and enhancement of state and major urban area fusion centers.

Nonprofit Security Grant Program

This grant program provides funds for target hardening and other physical security enhancements and activities to nonprofit organizations at high risk for terrorist attacks. It aims to integrate nonprofit preparedness with broader state and local efforts, promoting emergency preparedness and collaboration among public and private community representatives and government agencies. Tribal Homeland Security Grant Program

This grant program plays an important role in implementing the NPS by supporting the development, sustainment, and delivery of core capabilities essential to achieving a secure and resilient nation. The grant program supports DHS's and FEMA's focus on enhancing the ability of state, local, tribal, and territorial governments, as well as nonprofit organizations, to prevent, prepare for, protect against, respond to, and recover from terrorist attacks. Public Assistance Grant Program

This grant program offers supplemental grants to state, tribal, territorial, and local governments, as well as certain private non-profits, enabling a quick response and recovery from major



disasters or emergencies. This program also supports hazard mitigation measures to protect these facilities from future catastrophic events. More details can be found here.

Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) Program

This grant program provides state, local, tribal, and territorial emergency management agencies with the necessary resources to implement the NPS, working toward a secure and resilient nation. The EMPG's allowable costs support building and sustaining core capabilities across the prevention, protection, mitigation, and response and recovery mission areas. More details can be found here.

Science & Technology Directorate (S&T)

This grant program offers a variety of opportunities for engagement. S&T has previously funded research into targeted violence and terrorism prevention, radicalization and mobilization to violence, and evaluation of interventions. More details can be found here.



U.S. Department of Justice

National Institute of Justice (NIJ) Funding Opportunities

The DOJ's NIJ invites proposals for research and evaluation projects on several topics related to targeted violence and terrorism prevention, including research on school-based hate crimes, firearm violence and mass shootings, school safety, and domestic radicalization, More details can be found here.

The Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) Grants

COPS is responsible for advancing the practice of community policing by the nation's state, local, territorial, and tribal law enforcement agencies through information and grant resources. The COPS Office awards grants to hire community policing professionals, develop and test innovative policing strategies, and provide training and technical assistance to community members, local government leaders, and all levels of law enforcement. Office of Justice Programs (OJP) Grants

OJP provides innovative leadership to federal, state, local, and tribal justice systems by disseminating best practices and providing funding opportunities to improve the criminal, civil, and juvenile justice systems across America. OJP works in partnership with the justice community to identify the most pressing crime-related challenges confronting the justice system and provide information, training, coordination, and innovative strategies for addressing these challenges. Community-Based Violence Intervention and Prevention Initiative (CVIPI)

CVIPI is an initiative launched in 2022 to support comprehensive, evidence-based violence intervention and prevention programs. Through CVIPI grants, OJP awarded nearly \$200 million to community-based organizations, state and local governments, institutions conducting research and evaluation, capacity-building intermediaries, and training and technical assistance providers. Office on Violence Against Women (OVW)

OVW provides federal leadership in developing the national capacity to reduce violence against women and administering justice for, and strengthening services to, victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking. OVW offers grant programs to provide victims with the protection and services they need to pursue safe and healthy lives, while simultaneously enabling communities to hold offenders accountable for their violence. U.S. Department of Education, Office of Elementary and Secondary Education, National Center on Safe and Supportive Learning Environments

Project Prevent Grant Program

These grants are awarded to local educational agencies (LEAs) to provide students with counseling services, social and emotional support, and conflict resolution strategies. The aim is to prevent future violence and create a more safe and positive learning environment. More details can be found here.

School-Based Mental Health Services

This initiative supports state educational agencies, LEAs, and institutes of LEAs in increasing the number of qualified mental health service providers. The goal is to expand school-based mental health services in local educational agencies identified as in need. More details can be found here.

Title IV, Part A, Student Support and Academic Enrichment

Administered by the Technical Assistance Center, this program aims to enhance students' academic achievement by funding resources and programs for well-rounded education, such as improving school conditions and improving the use of technology to promote digital literacy. U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)

Mental Health Awareness Training Grants

This program provides training to school personnel and emergency services personnel to recognize the signs and symptoms of mental disorders as well as how to safely de-escalate crisis situations. It also offers a variety of educational tools relating to mental health awareness and fostering a resilient community. More details can be found here.

Expansion and Sustainability of the Comprehensive Community Mental Health Services for Children with Serious Emotional Disturbance

This program provides resources to improve the mental health outcomes for youth (age 0-21) at risk for or with serious emotional disturbances and support for their families. SAMHSA offers this program to prepare at-risk and affected children for a successful transition to adulthood. More details can be found here.



Resiliency In Communities After Stress and Trauma (ReCAST)

The ReCAST grants aim to enhance resilience and equity in communities that have recently experienced civil unrest. This is achieved through evidence-based violence prevention, community youth engagement programs, and connections to trauma-informed behavioral health services. More details can be found here.

Project AWARE (Advancing Wellness and Resiliency in Education)

Project AWARE aims to expand the capacity of state educational agencies, in partnership with state mental health agencies and local education agencies, to increase awareness of mental health issues among school-aged youth; provide training for school personnel and other adults who interact with school-aged youth to detect and respond to mental health issues; and connect school-aged youth who may have behavioral health issues and their families, to needed services. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention - Division of Violence Prevention

National Centers of Excellence in Youth Violence Prevention (YVPCs)

This 20-year initiative fosters academic-community collaborations that advance the science and practice of youth violence prevention. The mission of the YVPCs is to research and prevent youth violence and strengthen the use of effective prevention methods in communities. More details can be found here.

National Center for Healthy Safe Children

Safe Schools/Healthy Students

In 1999, the U.S. Departments of Education, Health and Human Services, and Justice launched the Safe Schools/Healthy Students Initiative in response to concerns about youth violence, substance abuse and school safety. This Federal grant adopts a comprehensive approach, leveraging best practices and the latest insights from education, justice, social, and mental health to empower communities to act. National Institutes of Health

Office of Behavioral and Social Sciences Research (OBSSR)

OBSSR participates in and leads several NIH-administered grant opportunities related to behavioral and social sciences research. In recent years, OBSSR has announced several notices of special interest on violence prevention research. More details can be found here.





U.S. Department of Health Resources and Service Administration (HRSA)

HRSA programs provide equitable health care to people who are geographically isolated and economically or medically vulnerable. This includes programs that deliver health services to people with HIV, pregnant people, mothers and their families, those with low incomes, residents of rural areas, American Indians and Alaska Natives, and those otherwise unable to access high-quality health care. HRSA programs also support health infrastructure through training of health professionals and distributing them to areas where they are needed most, providing financial support to health care providers, and advancing telehealth capabilities. In addition, HRSA oversees programs for providing discounts on prescription drugs to safety net providers; facilitating organ, bone marrow, and cord blood transplantation; compensating individuals injured by vaccination; and maintaining data on health care malpractice payments. Federal Office of Rural Health (FORHP)

FORHP administers grant programs designed to build health care capacity at both the local and state levels. These grants provide funds to 50 State Offices of Rural Health (SORH) to support on-going improvements in care, and to small rural hospitals through the Medicare Rural Hospital Flexibility Grant (Flex) program. Through its community-based programs, FORHP supports initiatives that encourage network development among rural health care providers, upgrades in emergency medical services, and the placement and training of the health care workforce in rural communities. U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs

Office of Rural Health

Congress established the Veterans Health Administration Office of Rural Health in 2006 to conduct, coordinate, promote, and disseminate research on issues that affect the nearly five million Veterans who reside in rural communities. The mandate also requires ORH to develop, refine, and promulgate policies, best practices, lessons learned, and innovative and successful programs. ORH fulfills its mission by supporting targeted research, developing innovative programs, and identifying new care models. Working through its five Veterans Rural Health Resource Centers as well as partners from academia, state and local governments, private industry, and non-profit organizations, ORH strives to break down the barriers separating rural Veterans from quality care.
