VI. Litigation

- In the matter of *Sierra Club v. U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) (4:17-cv-05273-KAW)* the plaintiff filed a FOIA request on November 19, 2016, seeking records pertaining to the scope of work that Logistics Management Institute (LMI) performed for CBP regarding border fencing and related tactical infrastructure. Plaintiff filed suit on September 12, 2017, claiming injunctive relief. On December 30, 2021, CBP issued 3,761 pages of records to the plaintiff.
- In the matter of *The Center for Biological Diversity v. U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) (4:17-cv-00163-CKJ)* the plaintiff filed a FOIA request on March 15, 2017, seeking records produced after January 25, 2017, pertaining to the

construction of a physical wall on the southern border of the United States. Plaintiff filed suit on July 17, 2017, claiming injunctive relief. On December 30, 2021, CBP release 507 pages of records to the plaintiff.
