

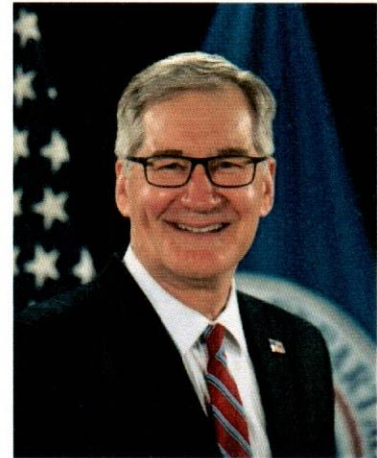

Executive Summary

DHS secures our Nation's air, land, and sea borders to prevent illegal activity while facilitating lawful travel and trade. The Department's border security and management efforts focus on three interrelated goals: effectively securing U.S. air, land, and sea borders; safeguarding and streamlining lawful trade and travel; and disrupting and, in coordination with other federal agencies, dismantling transnational criminal and terrorist organizations.

Through the unprecedented deployment of personnel, technology, and infrastructure, the U.S. border has never been more secure. The integration of intelligence and enforcement capabilities through intergovernmental task forces and partnerships has facilitated better information sharing leading to the increased interdiction of drugs, weapons, and currency. By focusing on the highest threats and responding rapidly, DHS has strengthened security across all U.S. borders while simultaneously facilitating international travel and trade.

Highlights for FY 2015 Q1–Q2 compared to FY 2014 Q1–Q2:

- U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) Border Patrol (BP) apprehensions were 28 percent less in FY 2015 Q1–Q2 (154,626) than FY 2014 Q1–Q2 (214,660) (see Table 1).
- CBP BP apprehensions of Mexicans were 17 percent lower during FY 2015 Q1–Q2 (94,709) compared to FY 2014 Q1–Q2 (114,672). Apprehensions of non-Mexicans were 40 percent lower during FY 2015 Q1–Q2 (59,917) than during FY 2014 Q1–Q2 (99,988) (Tables 2 and 3).
- The number of DHS removals decreased 17 percent between FY 2015 Q1–Q2 (166,889) and FY 2014 Q1–Q2 (201,353) (Figure 18).
- The number of DHS returns decreased 15 percent between FY 2015 Q1–Q2 (65,007) and FY 2014 Q1–Q2 (76,093) (Figure 18).

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I. Legislative Requirement

This report has been prepared pursuant to the direction in the Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying the *Fiscal Year (FY) 2015 Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Appropriations Act* (P.L. 114-4). The Joint Explanatory Statement accompanying P.L. 114-4 states:

Reporting of Operational Statistics

The Department shall continue quarterly submission of the Border Security Status reports, as required by the Senate.

Senate Report 113-198 states:

QUARTERLY REPORTS OF OPERATIONAL STATISTICS

The Committee continues its requirement that the Department submit quarterly Border Security Status ... reports, as directed in prior years.

II. Background

A. Overview of Congressional Mandate

This Border Security Status Report (BSSR) includes data for the second quarter of FY 2015. The BSSR is a revised version of the Secure Border Initiative (SBI) report, which was last released with data through FY 2010. The next report will include data through the third quarter of FY 2015.

The original *Quarterly Status Report on the Department of Homeland Security's Border Security Performance and Resources* was provided in 2006 in response to a letter from the House Appropriations Committee. The data series included in the BSSR overlaps with many of those in prior border security performance and resources reports; however, the BSSR excludes detailed program descriptions, accomplishments, and resource information. The list of data series provided in this report was reviewed with committee staff and is described in section B. The 2012 Conference Report and committee staff added new reporting requirements that are described in section C. These items will be added to future reports as they become available.

B. Data Presented

There are 25 figures and 19 tables in the body of the report and 32 tables in the appendix that provide data on the below enforcement related activities. This report provides data on the following categories of border security and immigration enforcement-related activities. Note that data for FYs 2002 to 2010 have been shifted to the appendix:

III. Results/Analysis

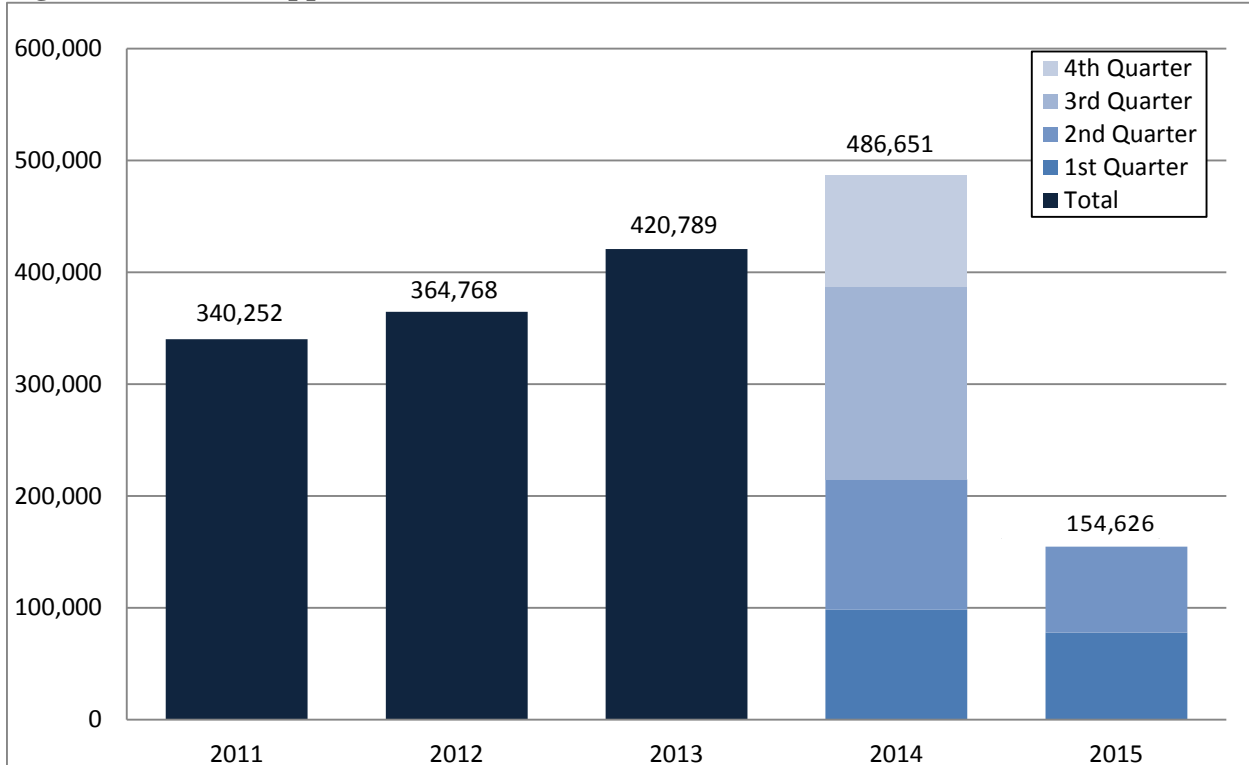
A. Data Trends

- CBP Border Patrol (BP) apprehensions were 28 percent less in FY 2015 Q1–Q2 (154,626) than FY 2014 Q1–Q2 (214,660) (see Table 1).
- CBP BP apprehensions of Mexicans were 17 percent lower during FY 2015 Q1–Q2 (94,709) compared to FY 2014 Q1–Q2 (114,672). Apprehensions of non-Mexicans were 40 percent lower during FY 2015 Q1–Q2 (59,917) than during FY 2014 Q1–Q2 (99,988) (Tables 2 and 3).
- CBP Office of Field Operations (OFO) issued NTAs increased more than 50 percent; from 8,029 in FY 2014 Q1–Q2 to 12,315 in FY 2015 Q1–Q2 (Figure 7).
- The number of DHS removals decreased 17 percent between FY 2015 Q1–Q2 (166,889) and FY 2014 Q1–Q2 (201,353) (Figure 18).
- The number of DHS returns decreased 15 percent between FY 2015 Q1–Q2 (65,007) and FY 2014 Q1–Q2 (76,093) (Figure 18).

The figures and tables in this section include notes about the data sources and, when applicable, descriptions of changes in definitions over time or in data compared to past reports. Quarterly data for FYs 2011–2015 Q2, when not included in the Results/Analysis section, are provided in the appendix (see IV. Appendix, Section C., Data Tables). The data included in this report were provided by Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), CBP, and U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) and may differ from data reported by each Component because of differences in data compilation or reporting practices.

¹ An administrative arrest refers to the arrest of an alien who is charged with an immigration violation under a provision of the Immigration and Nationality Act pursuant to sections 212 or 237. Administrative arrests conducted by BP traditionally have been referred to as apprehensions and this convention is used in the following BP charts and tables. Administrative arrest data are provided for CBP BP, ICE Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), and ICE Enforcement and Removal Operations.

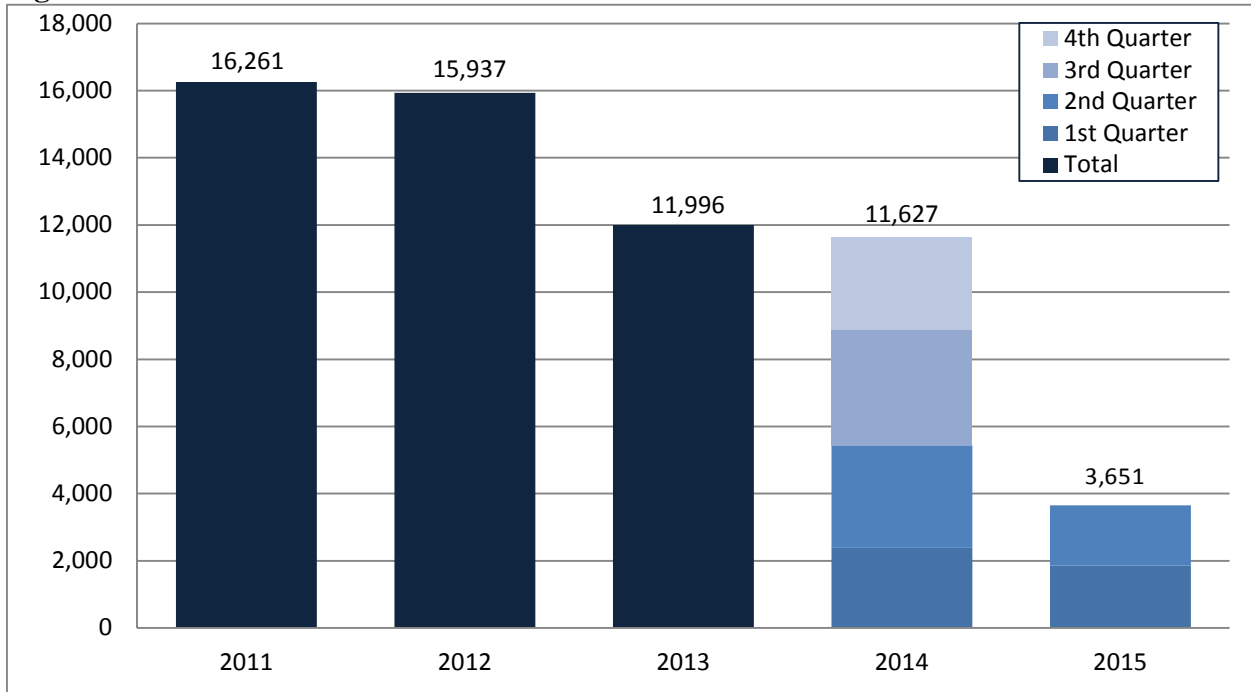

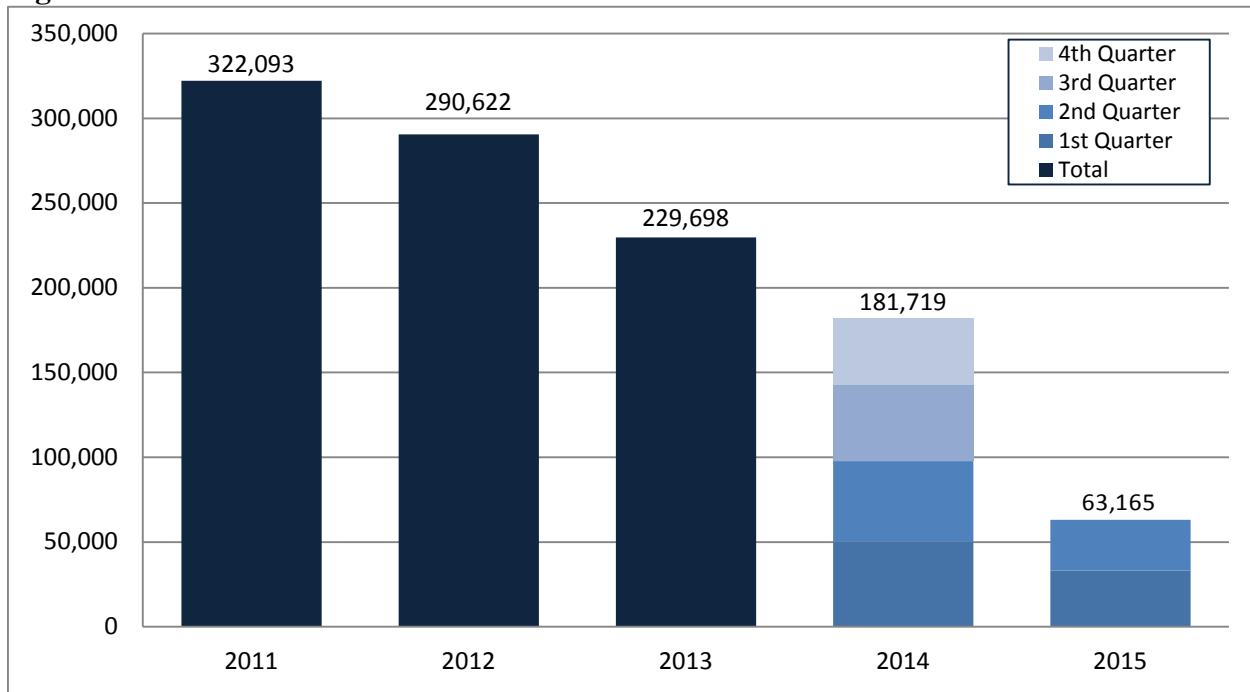

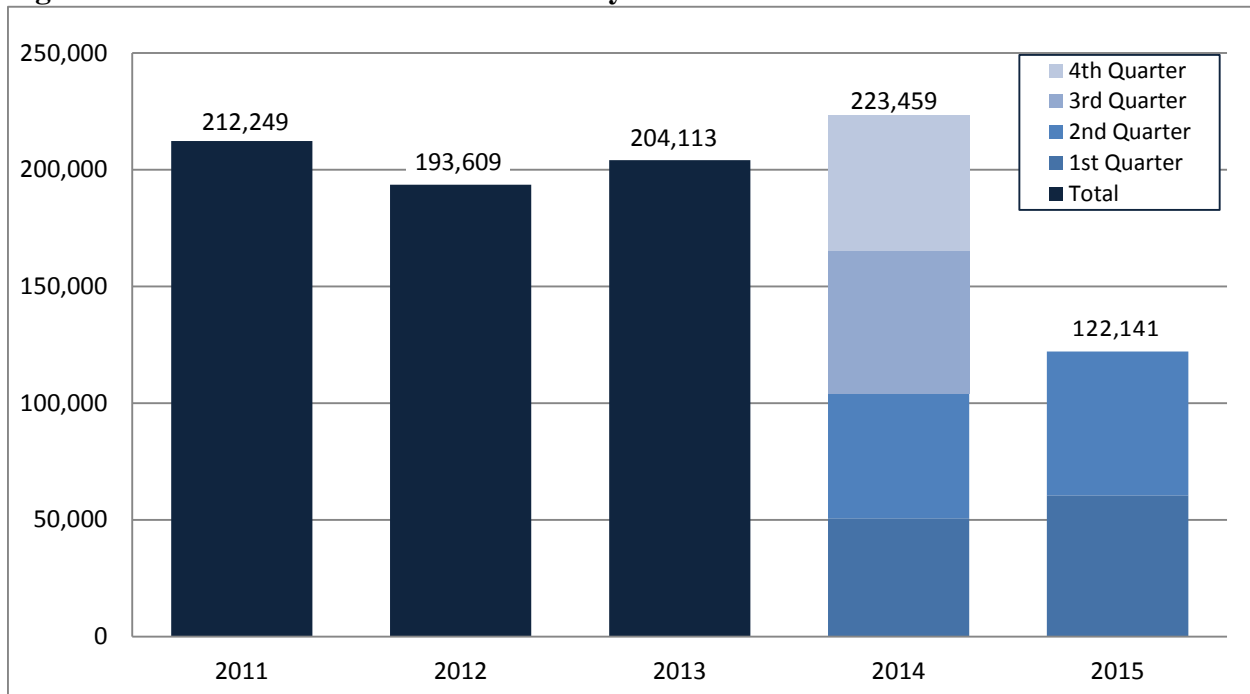
Figure 3. ICE ERO Administrative Arrests: FYs 2011 to 2015

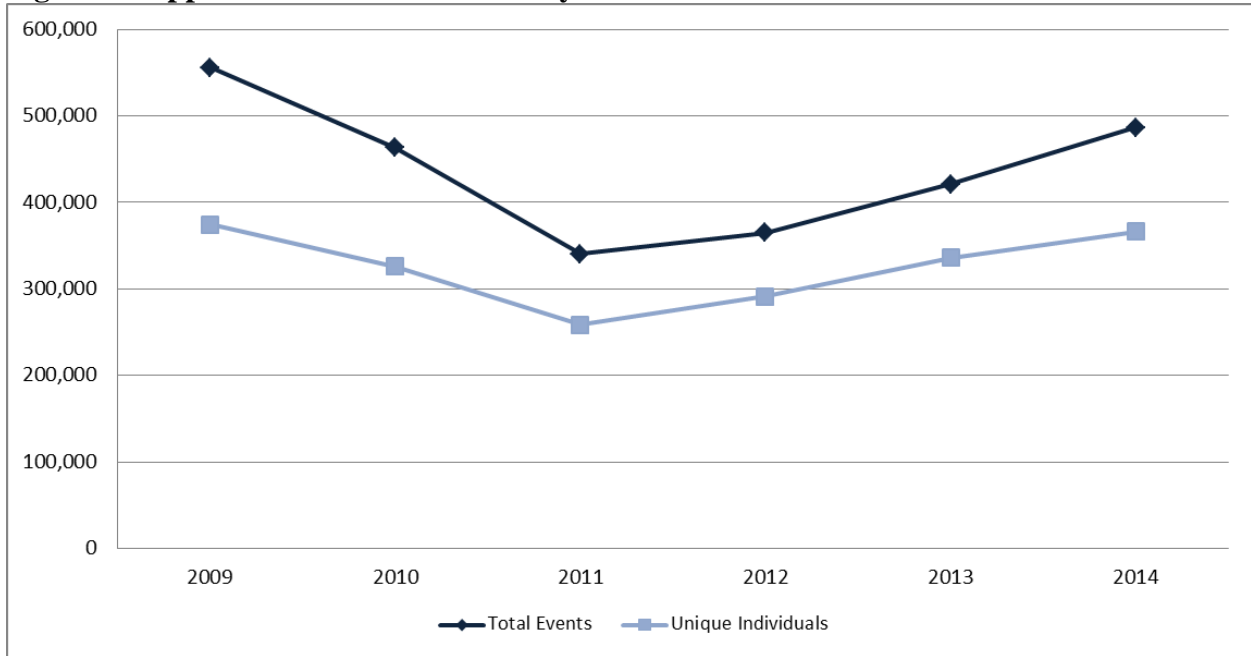

C. Unique Individuals Apprehended by CBP BP (Figure 5)

With the Automated Biometric Identification System (IDENT), fingerprint records can be matched, making it possible to count both the unique number of individuals apprehended and the total number of apprehensions (see Figure 5).

Figure 5. Apprehensions from IDENT by CBP BP: FYs 2009 to 2014

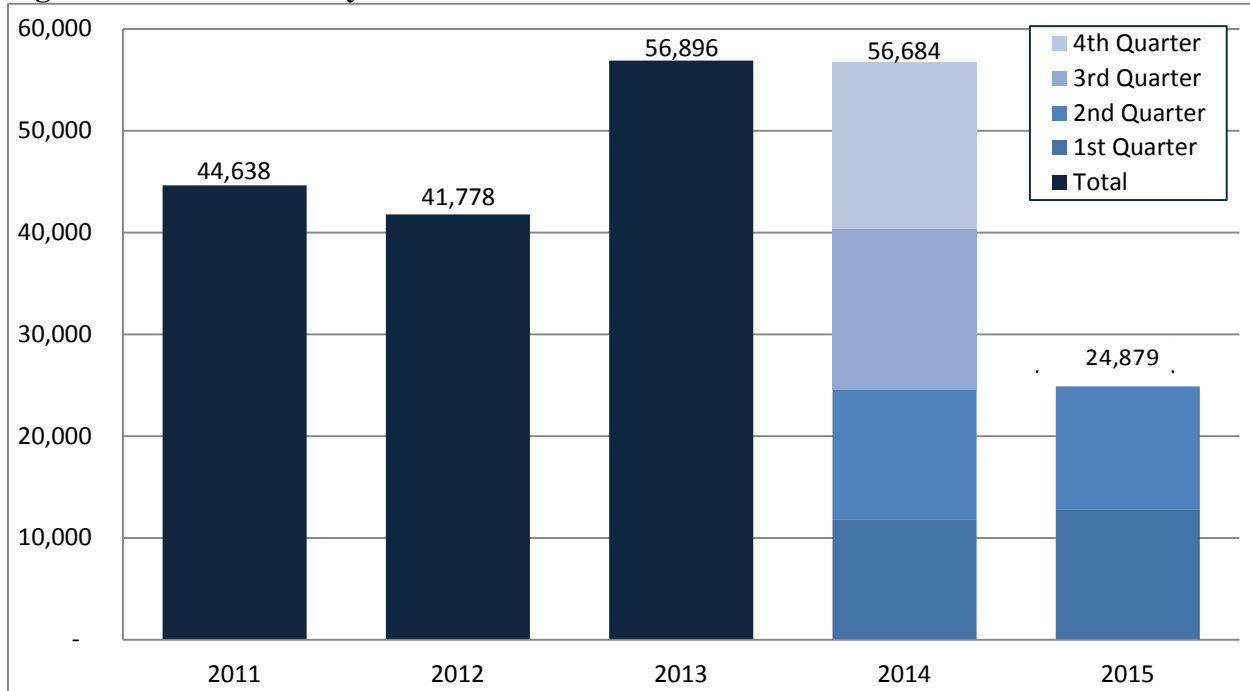

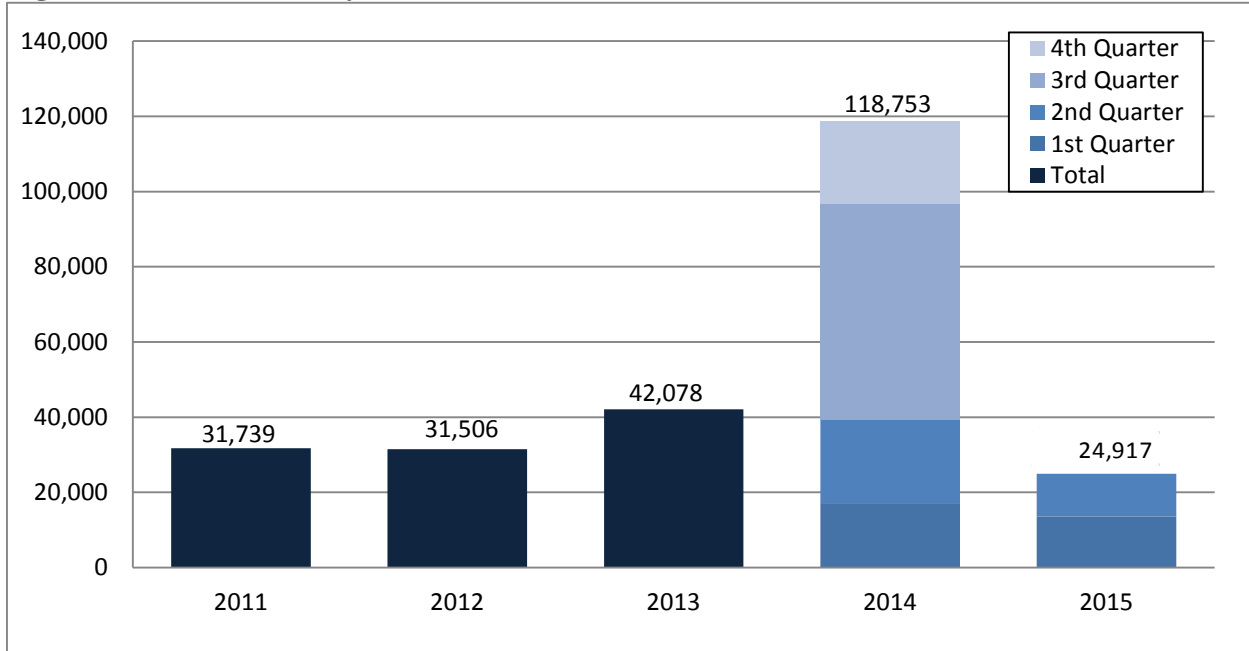
Figure 6. NTAs Issued by USCIS: FYs 2011 to 2015

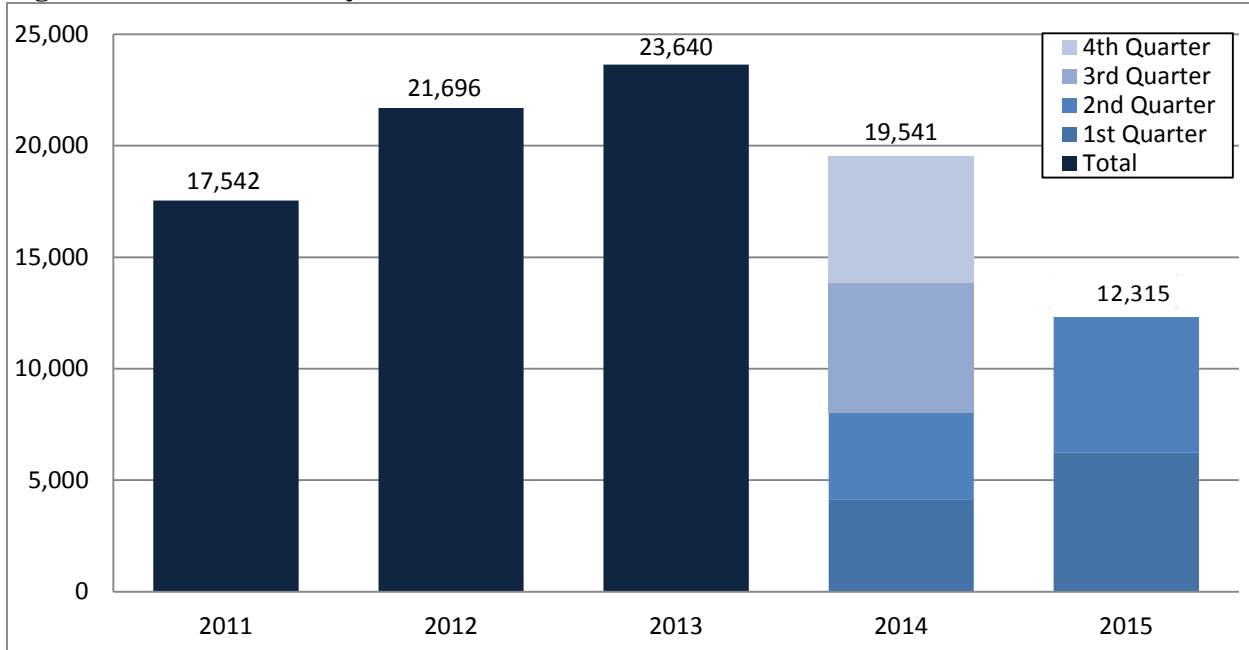

Figure 7. NTAs Issued by CBP BP: FYs 2011 to 2015



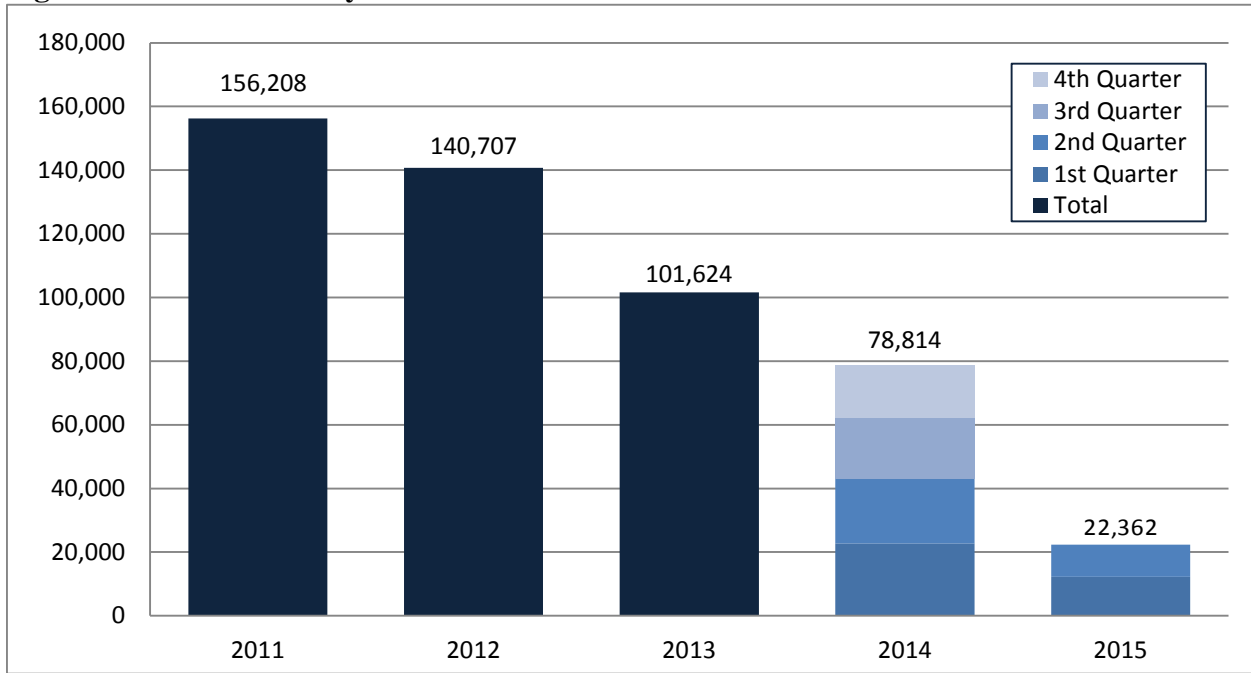

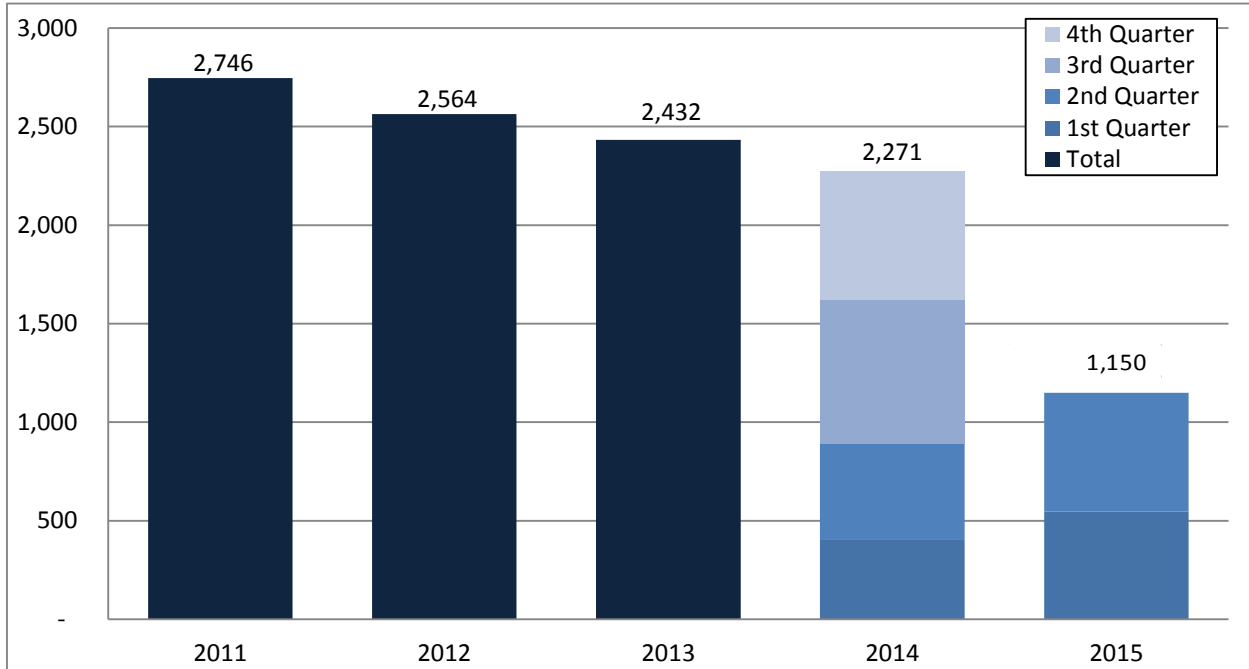
Figure 9. NTAs Issued by ICE ERO: FYs 2011 to 2015

Figure 10. USCIS Fraud Cases Referred to ICE for Criminal Investigation: FYs 2011 to 2015

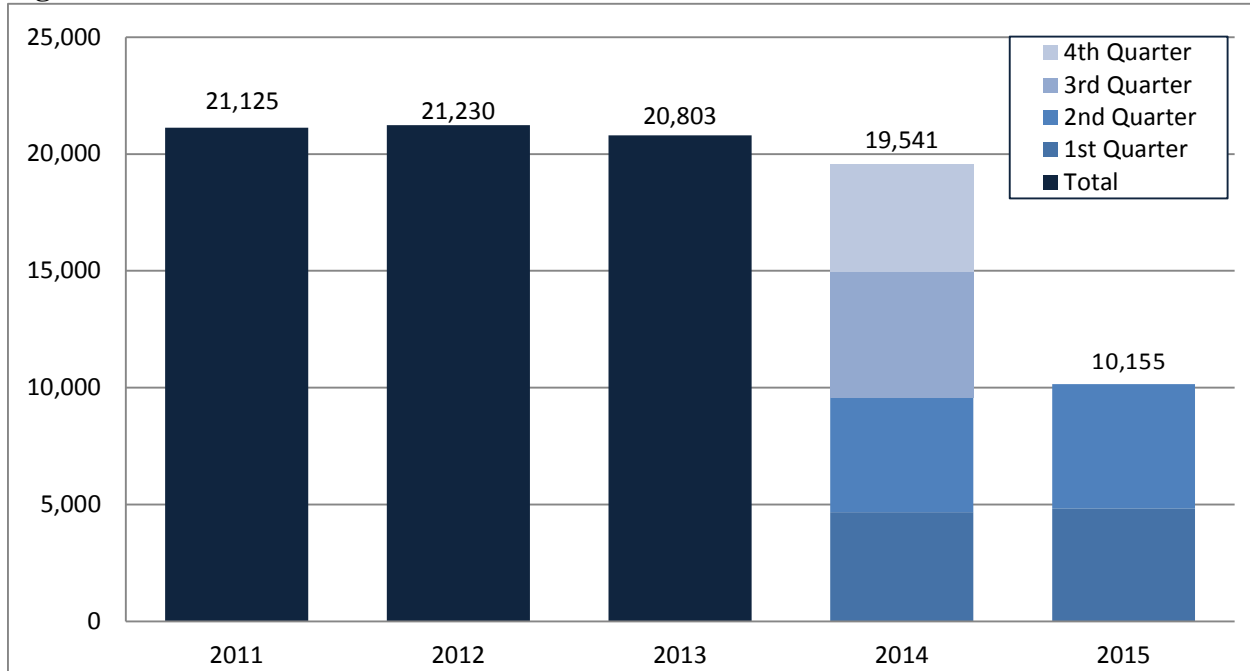

E. Criminal Arrests (Figures 11–13)

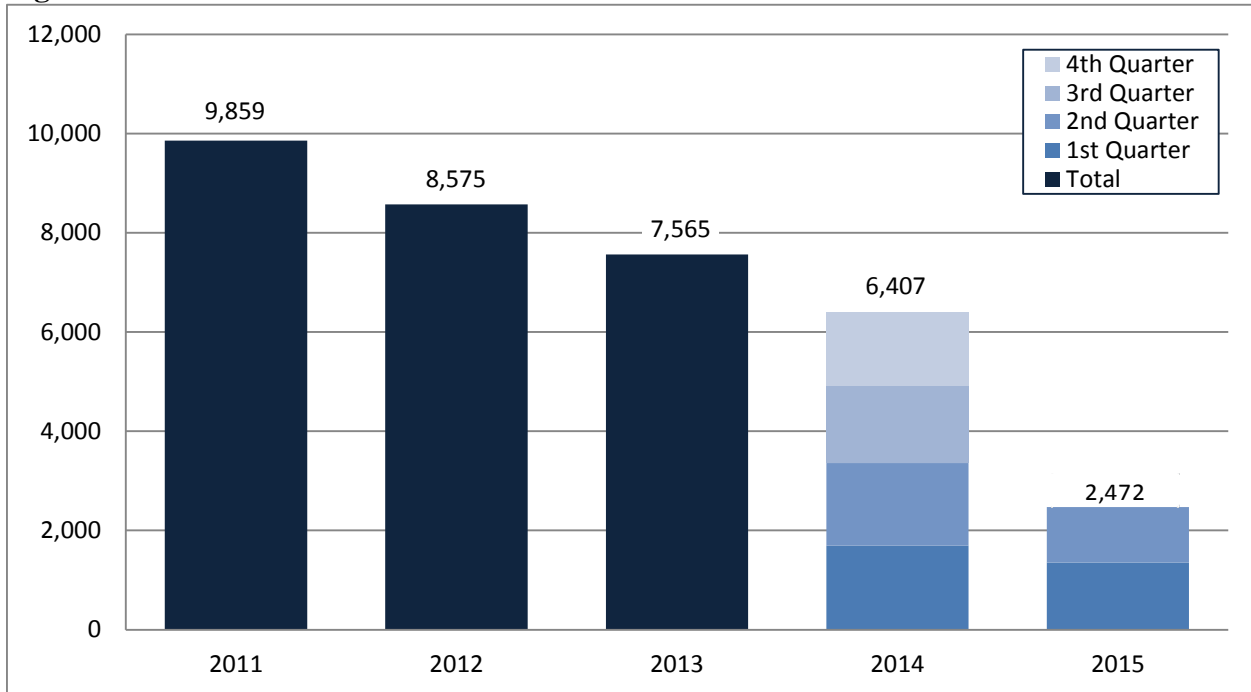
Criminal arrests refer to individuals (both aliens and U.S. citizens) who are arrested for violation of a federal and/or a state criminal code. Criminal arrests may be for felony or misdemeanor charges. Criminal arrest data are provided for ICE HSI, ICE ERO, and CBP OFO.

Figure 11. ICE HSI Criminal Arrests: FYs 2011 to 2015



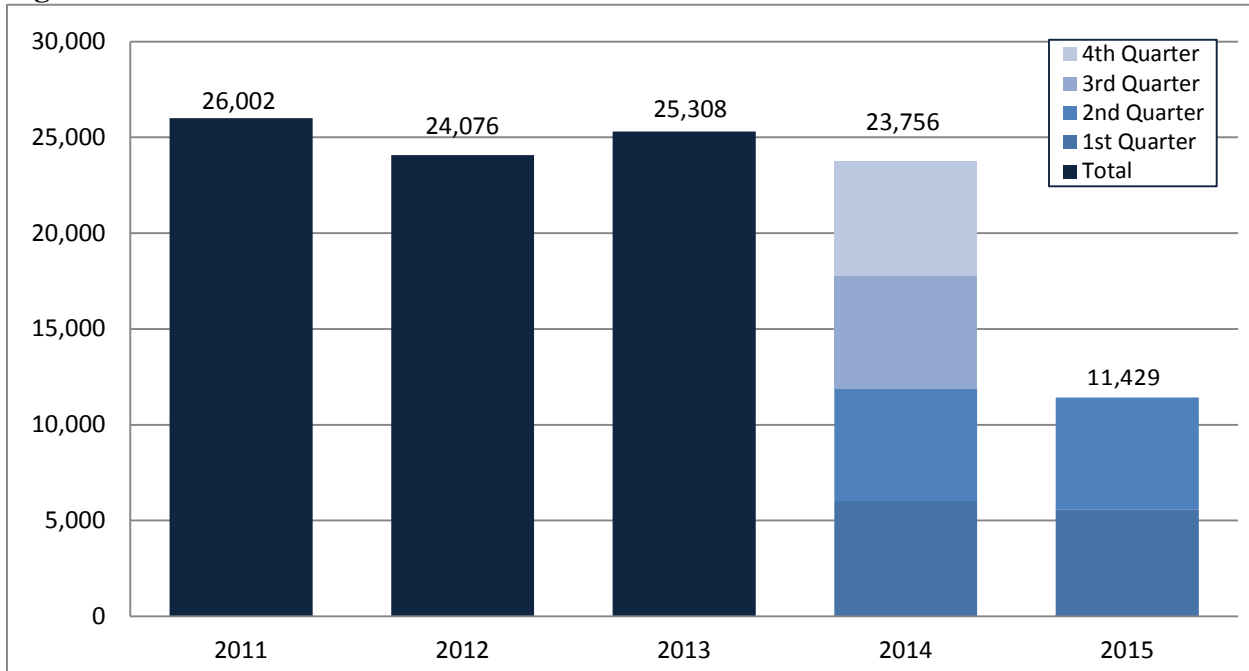

Figure 13. CBP OFO Criminal Arrests: FYs 2011 to 2015



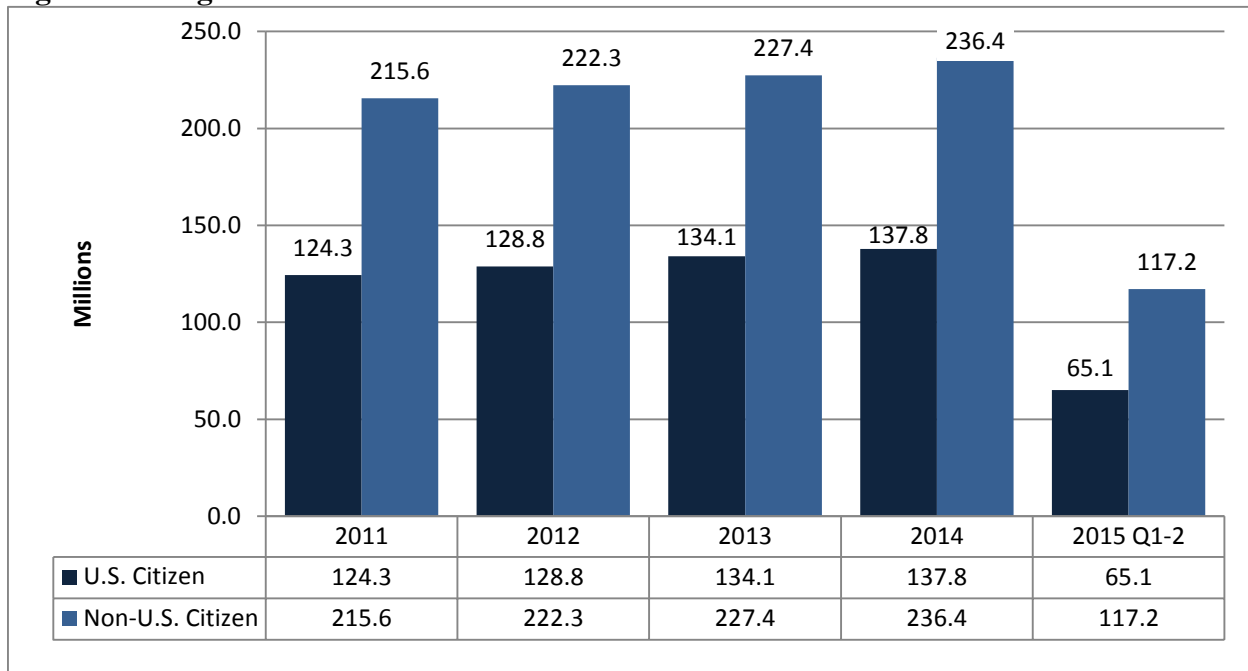

F. Legal Entries (Figure 14 and Table 5)

Legal entries refer to the number of entrances of U.S. citizens and noncitizens into the United States. Individual U.S. citizens and noncitizens may be counted more than once during a reporting period. Individuals denied entry at air, land, or sea ports are excluded from these data.

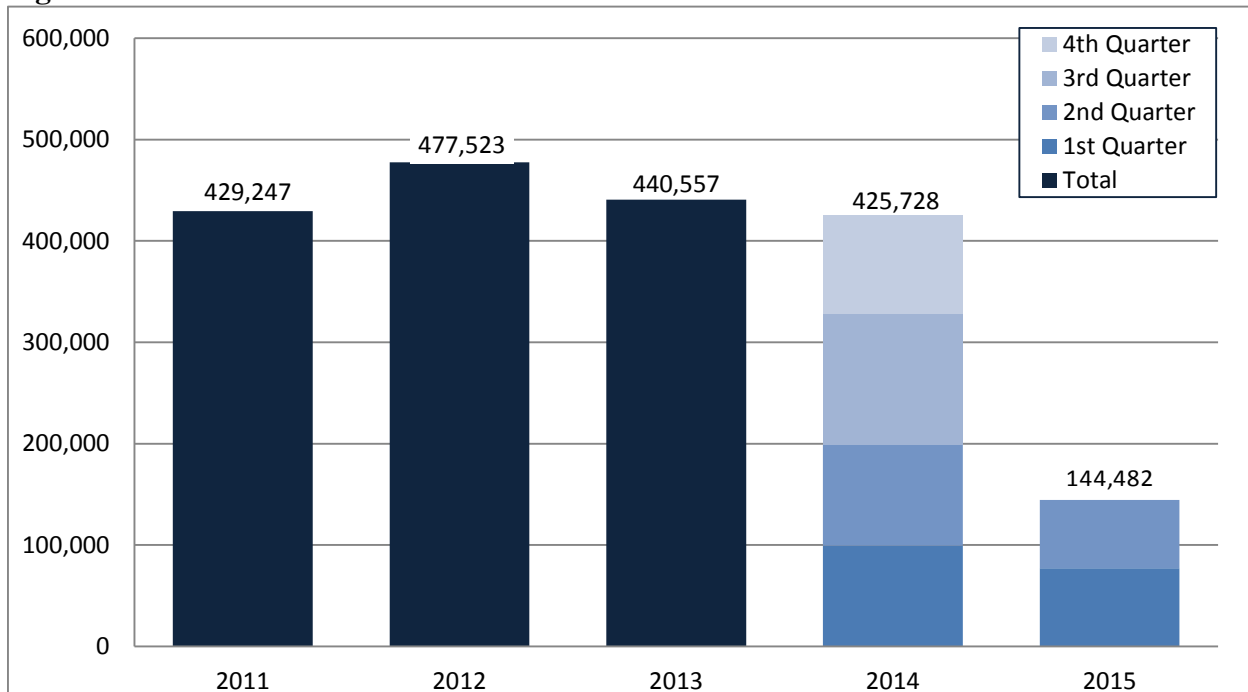

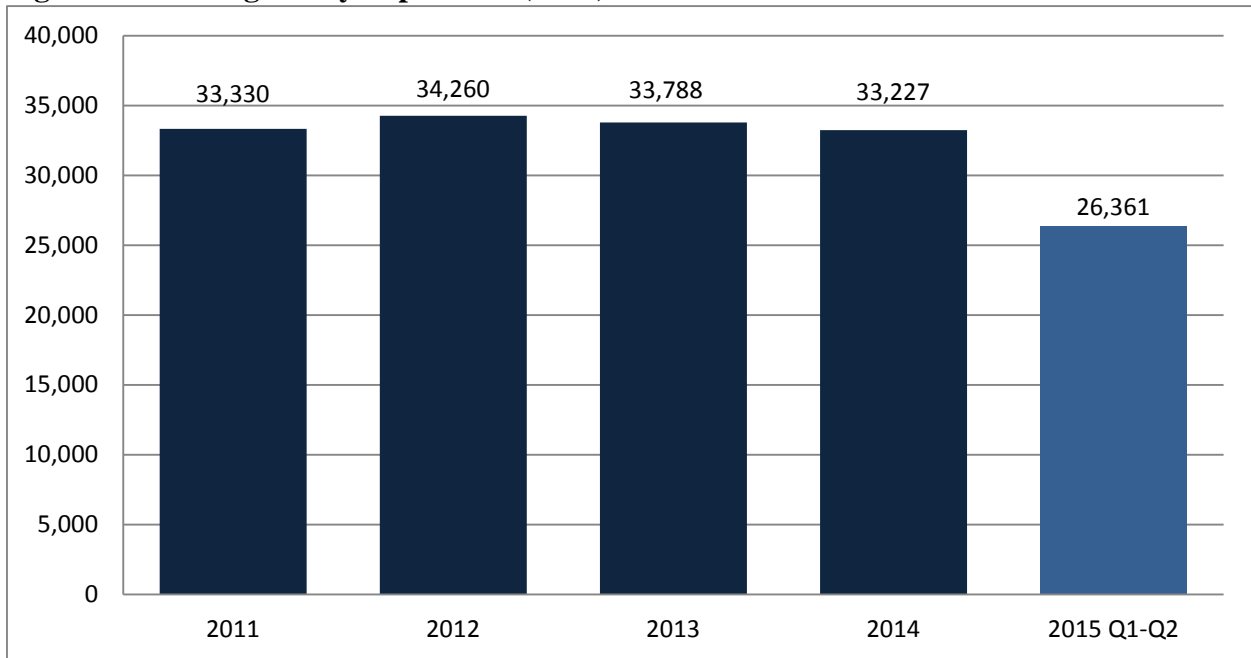
Figure 15. Initial Admissions to ICE Detention Facilities: FYs 2011 to 2015

G. Detention (Figures 15–17 and Tables 6–8)

Removable aliens who are apprehended by ICE and CBP and are determined to need custodial supervision are placed in detention facilities that are managed by ICE ERO. Aliens detained by ICE are housed in local or state facilities, contract detention facilities, ICE-owned facilities (service processing centers), and Bureau of Prisons facilities.

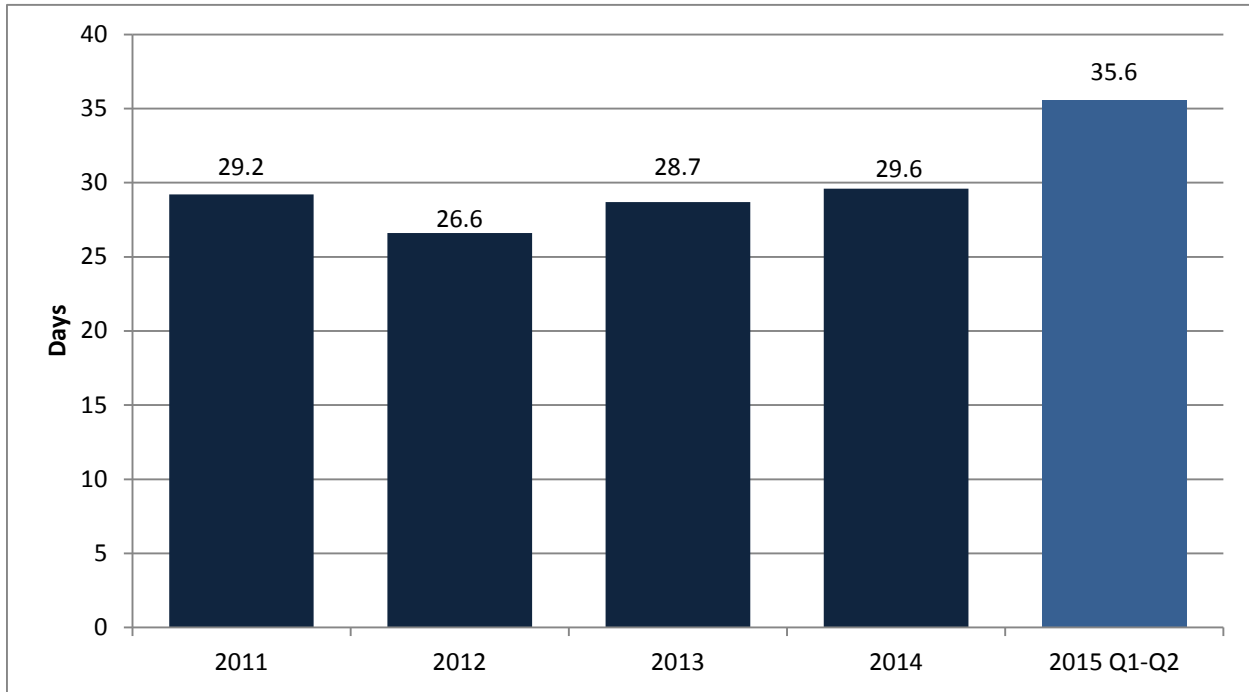

FYs 2011 to 2015**

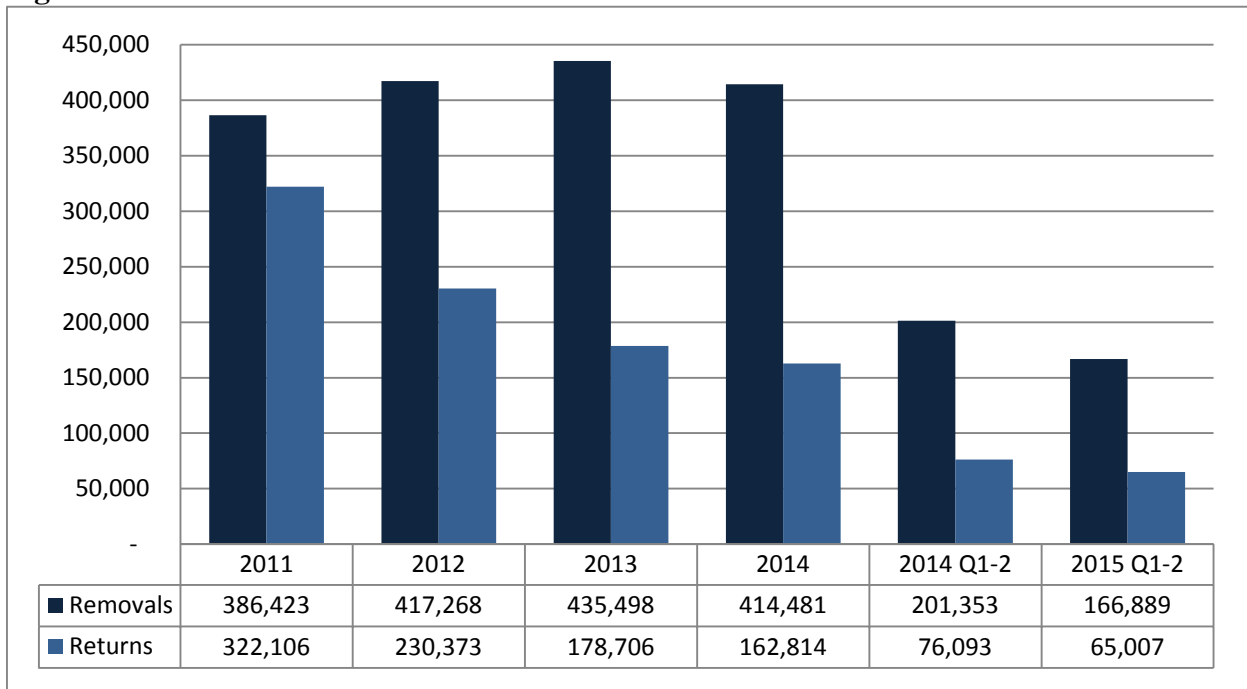

H. Removals and Returns (Figure 18)

Alien removals refer to inadmissible or deportable aliens who have been removed on the basis of an order of removal, whereas alien returns refer to inadmissible or deportable aliens who have been confirmed to have departed the United States without an order of removal. This report includes fiscal year removals effectuated and returns conducted by both ICE and CBP. An alien who is removed has administrative or criminal consequences placed on subsequent reentry owing to the fact of the removal.

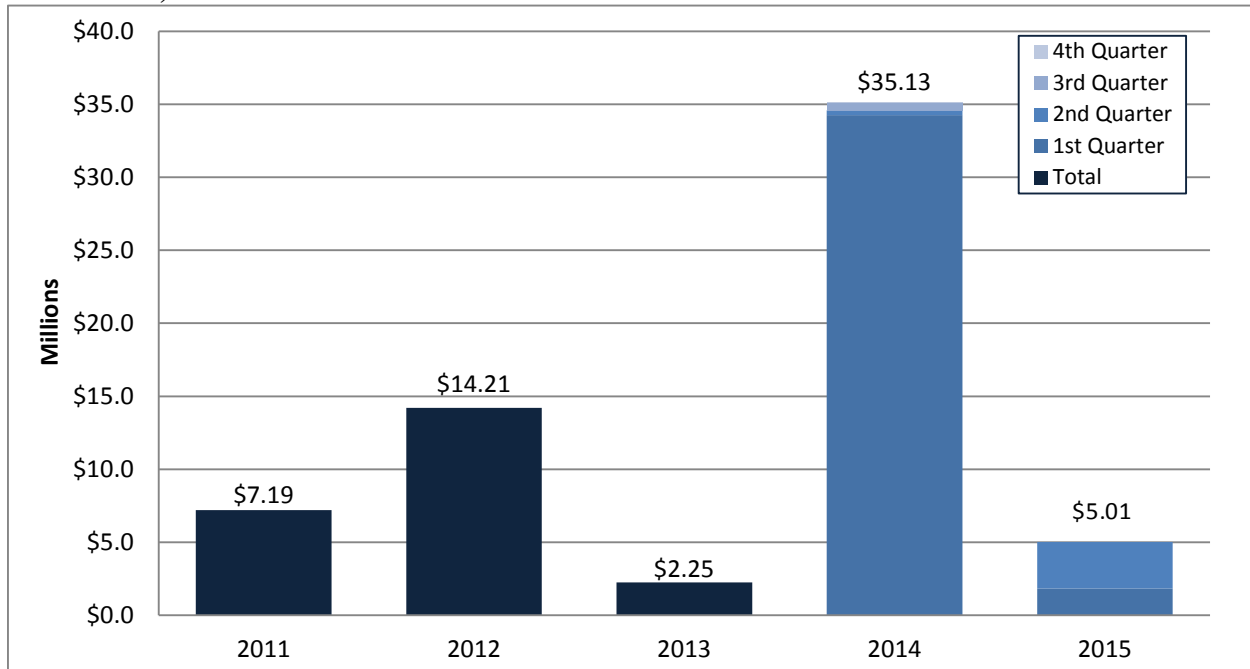

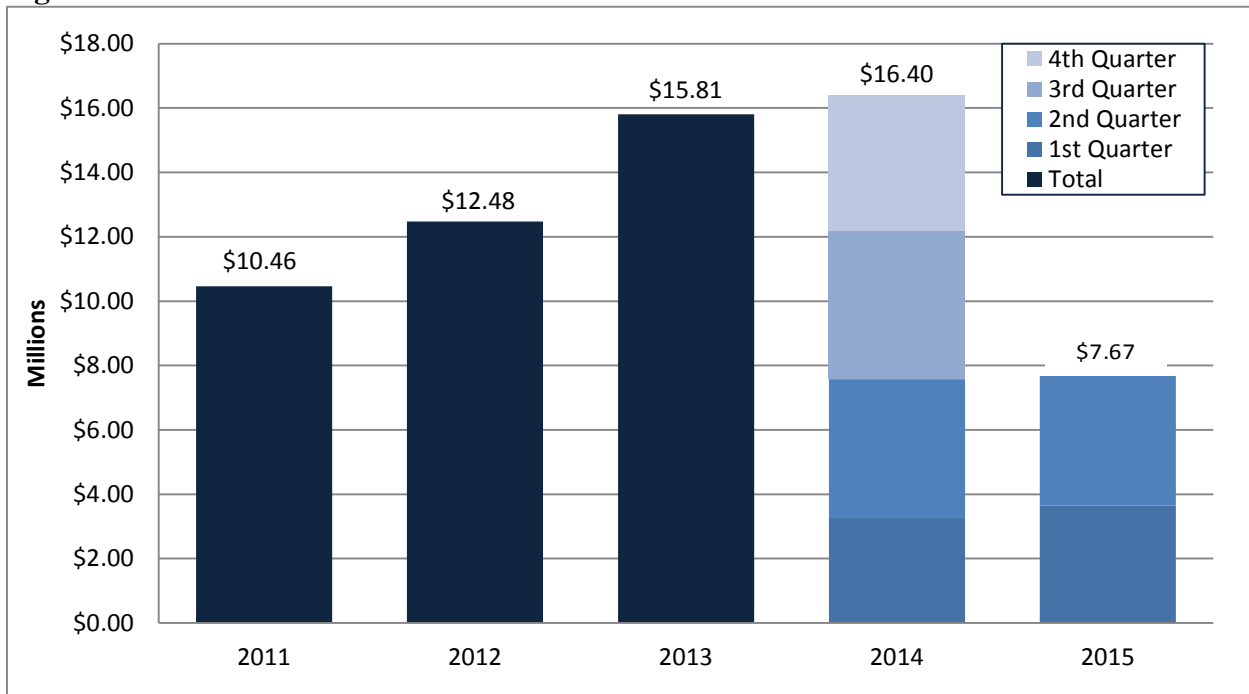
Figure 19. Worksite Enforcement Judicially Ordered Amount of Criminal Fines, Forfeitures, and Restitutions: FYs 2011 to 2015

I. Worksite Enforcement and E-Verify (Figures 19–24)

Worksite arrest statistics are shown for employers who are charged by ICE HSI with violations related to the employment of unauthorized aliens, and employees, who are charged with a variety of crimes including identity theft, fraud, tax violations, or other related crimes.

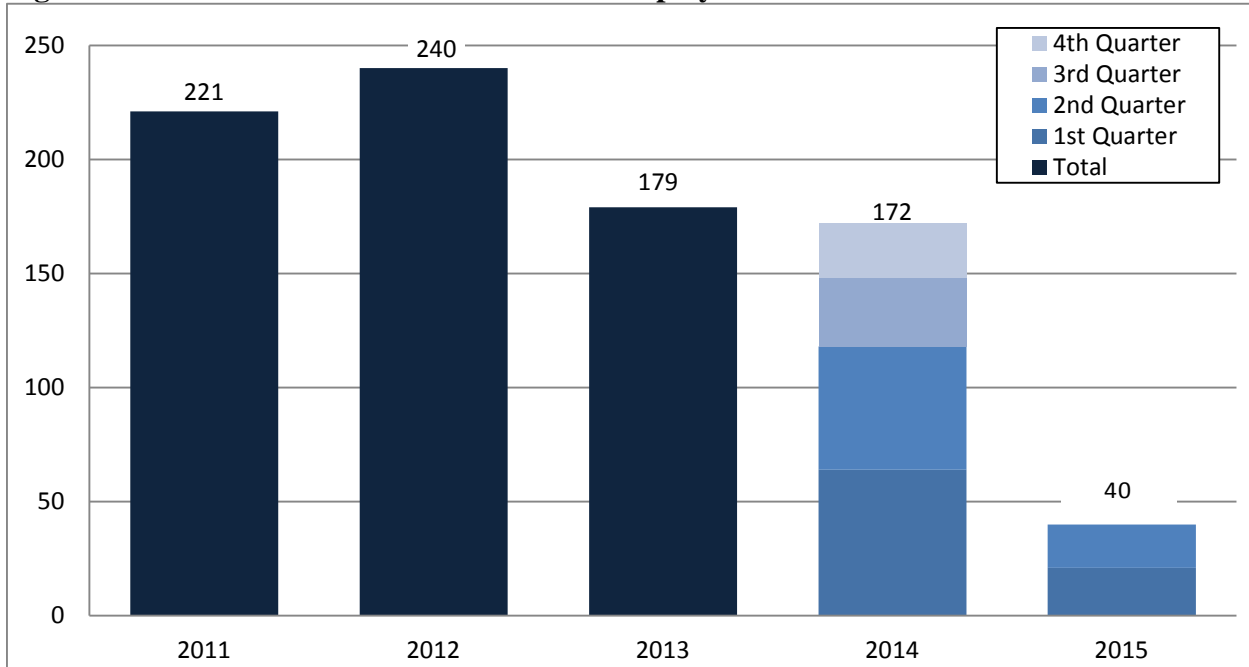
Figure 20. Worksite Enforcement Final Orders of Civil Fines: FYs 2011 to 2015

Worksite fines are in Figures 19 and 20 below. The worksite enforcement judicially ordered amount of criminal fines, forfeitures, and restitutions are penalties handled by the Department of Justice within the criminal court system. The worksite enforcement final orders of civil fines are assessed by ICE and go before an administrative law judge if settlement is not reached.

The number of employers registered for E-Verify and the number of queries each year also are provided below.

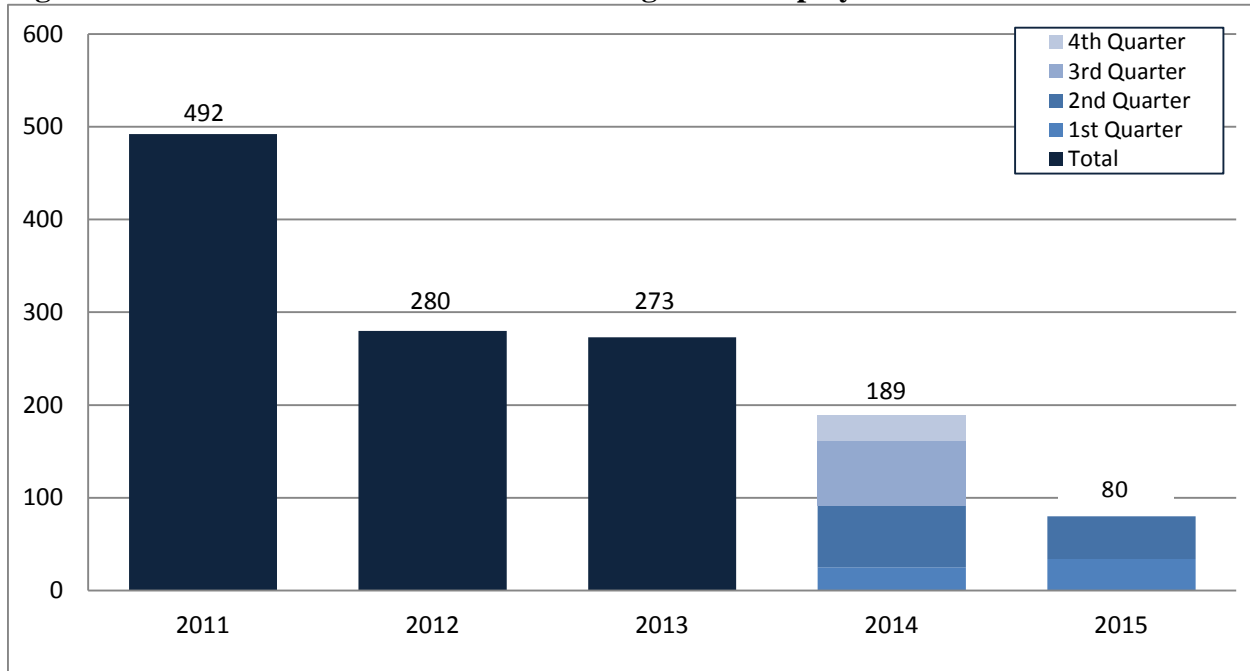
Figure 21. ICE Worksite Arrests—Owners/Employers: FYs 2011 to 2015

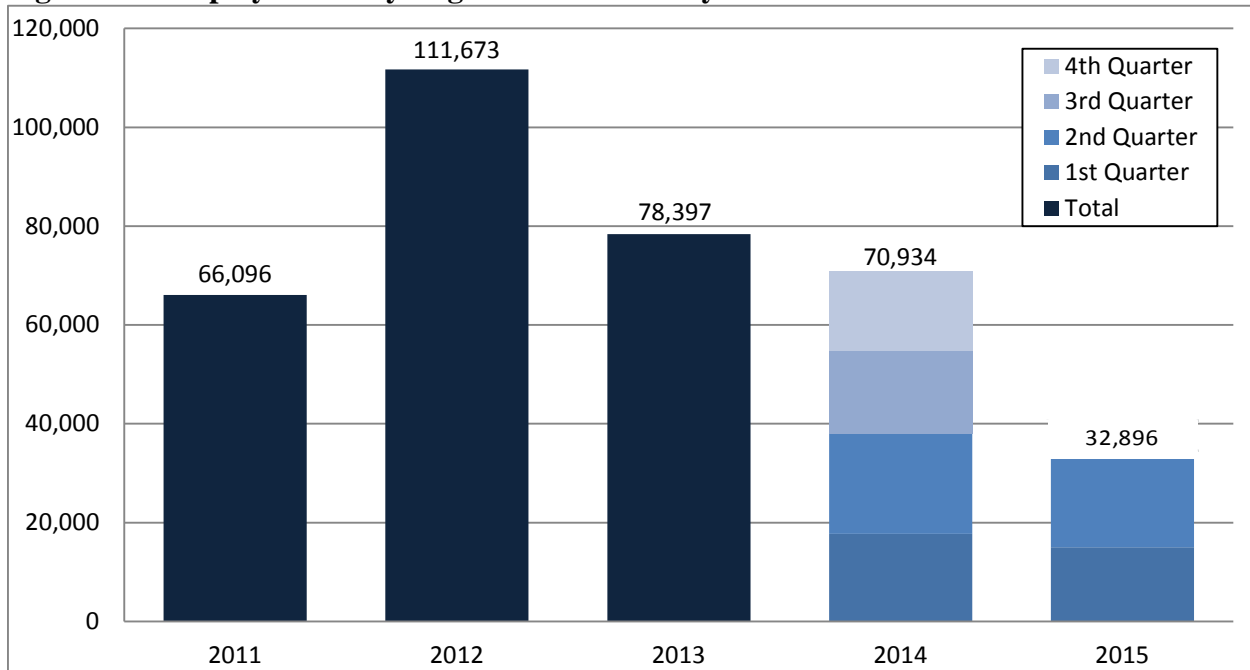
Figure 22. ICE Worksite Arrests—Non-Management Employees: FYs 2011 to 2015

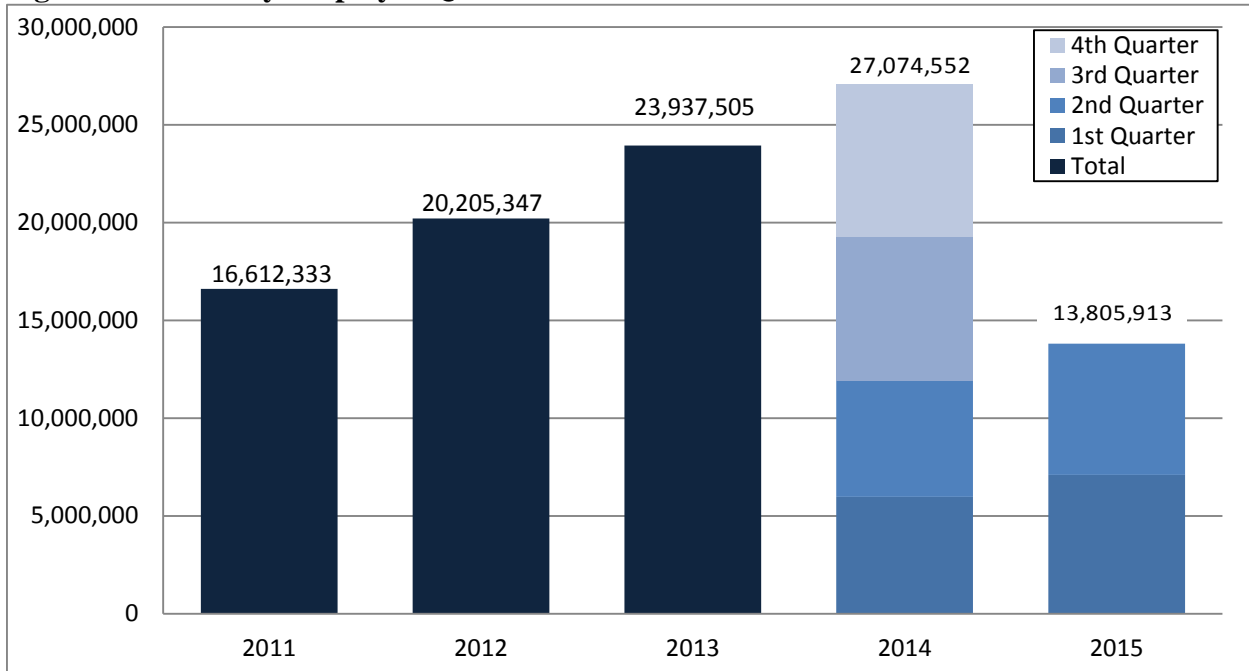
Figure 23. Employers Newly Registered in E-Verify: FYs 2011 to 2015

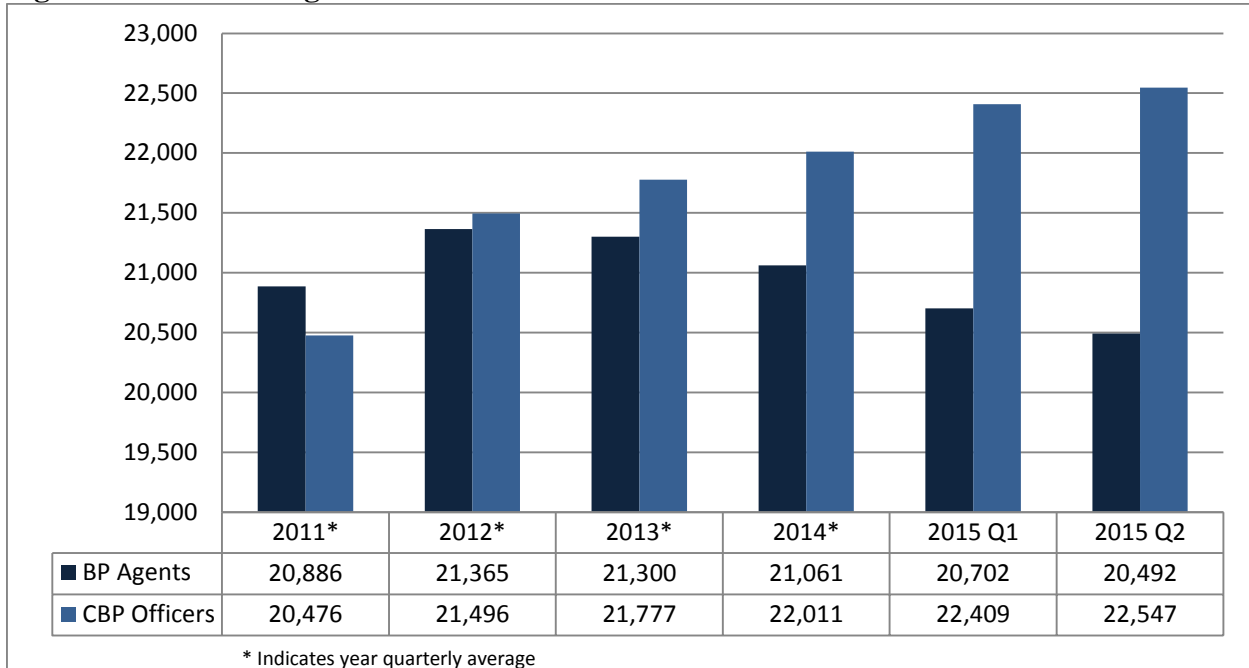

IV. Appendices

Appendix A. Glossary

Administrative arrest – The arrest of an alien who is charged with removability under the provisions of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA).

Average Daily Detention Population – Average daily detention population for the months included in the reporting period, where the detention population for any month is equal to the average daily detention population during the period.

Average Length of Stay in Detention – The mean length of stay in detention from the time of initial admission to the time of release for those aliens released during the reporting period. Aliens in detention at the end of the reporting period are excluded from the calculation.

Consequence Delivery System (CDS) – A U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP)-developed system that guides management and agents through a process that is designed to evaluate each subject apprehended by the Border Patrol and to identify the most appropriate consequence based on the individual's crossing history. CDS initially was implemented in the Tucson Sector in January 2011 and now is deployed across the Southwest Border. CDS guidance generally indicates that formal removal is more effective and efficient than voluntary return and CDS implementation has resulted in the increased use of removal rather than return for aliens apprehended by the Border Patrol.

E-Verify – An Internet-based system administered by USCIS in partnership with the Social Security Administration that allows employers to verify the employment eligibility of workers electronically.

Inadmissible Alien – An alien seeking admission into the United States or who is present without being admitted or paroled who is ineligible to be admitted according to the provisions of INA § 212.

Removals – The compulsory and confirmed movement of an inadmissible or deportable alien out of the United States based on an order of removal. Ineligibility to remain in the United States is based on grounds of inadmissibility under INA § 212 or deportability under INA § 237. An alien who is removed has administrative or criminal consequences placed on subsequent reentry owing to the fact of the removal. This report includes removals effectuated by both U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and CBP.

Returns – The confirmed movement of an inadmissible or deportable alien out of the United States not based on an order of removal. Ineligibility to remain in the United States is based on grounds of inadmissibility under INA § 212 or deportability under INA § 237. An alien waives his or her right to a formal proceeding and chooses to depart the United States and return to his or her home country in lieu of removal proceedings. This report includes returns effectuated by both ICE and CBP.

Queries – For the purposes of the E-Verify program, each query represents one new hire.

Seizure – Taking physical possession and/or control of property, merchandise, or other articles from the possession or control of an individual or establishment.

Violence against BP Agents – Any assault directed at a BP agent in the performance of or with a nexus to their official duties, including, but not limited to rockings, shootings, vehicular assaults, other physical assaults, and any other threat of bodily harm or death, while engaged in or on account of border enforcement activities.

Violence against OFO Officers – Physical threats or elevated use of force occurring in reaction to a legitimate or perceived threat to OFO personnel. Along with physical assaults, violent incidents involve vehicles being operated in a manner that posed a risk or harm or the use or intended use of a deadly weapon.

287(g) program – The 287(g) Program is a state and local cross-designation program authorized by Immigration and Nationality Act § 287(g). This program provides specific officers of participating state and local law enforcement agencies with the necessary delegation of authority, training, and resources to perform certain functions of an immigration officer under the direction of ICE.
