System Assessment and Validation for Emergency Responders

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) established the System Assessment and Validation for Emergency Responders (SAVER) Program to assist emergency responders making procurement decisions.

Located within the Science and Technology Directorate (S&T) of DHS, the SAVER Program conducts objective assessments and validations on commercial equipment and systems, and provides those results along with other relevant equipment information to the emergency response community in an operationally useful form. SAVER provides information on equipment that falls within the categories listed in the DHS Authorized Equipment List (AEL). The SAVER Program mission includes:

- Conducting impartial, practitioner-relevant, operationally oriented assessments and validations of emergency responder equipment;
- Providing information that enables decision makers and responders to better select, procure, use, and maintain emergency responder equipment.

Information provided by the SAVER Program will be shared nationally with the responder community, providing a life- and cost-saving asset to DHS, as well as to federal, state, and local responders.

The SAVER Program is supported by a network of technical agents who perform assessment and validation activities. Further, SAVER focuses primarily on two main questions for the emergency responder community: "What equipment is available?" and "How does it perform?"

Package Screening Systems

Package screening systems are fixed systems, such as conveyor-belt X-ray systems, used to screen packages for hazardous material or devices. These systems are typically located at aviation, mass transit, and military checkpoints, correctional and judicial facility entrances, and in government and commercial building lobbies. The systems are primarily used to detect contraband concealed in hand-carried items in order to prevent their transport into secured areas. Hand-carried items may include carry-on luggage, briefcases, backpacks, purses, electronic equipment, garments, and shoes.

As a SAVER Program Technical Agent, Science Application International Corporation (SAIC) conducted a market survey in order to provide information on commercially available equipment, and produced the *Market Survey Report on Package Screening Systems*.
