## Part I, Section A – Executive Summary

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) hereby submits this Annual Performance Report on Executive Agency Actions to Assist Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) for Fiscal Year (FY) 2009, pursuant to Executive Order 13256. Executive Order 13256 was most recently re-issued on February 12, 2002 in order to advance the development of the Nation's full potential and to advance equal opportunity in higher education, to strengthen the capacity of HBCUs to provide the highest quality education, and to increase opportunities for these institutions to participate in and benefit from Federal programs.

DHS is committed to supporting the objectives of Executive Order 13256, and DHS's Office for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties (CRCL) reports on the continual Department-wide planning and activities to assist HBCUs. DHS's FY 2009 Annual Performance Report reflects the Department's unified efforts – including the consolidation and coordination of all DHS Support and Operational Component HBCU activities – to meaningfully and efficiently strengthen HBCUs. This Report specifically focuses on the objective of Executive Order 13256 to use grant awards to promote opportunities for HBCUs to participate in programs that develop the capacity of HBCUs to contribute to the development of human capital and to strengthen America's economic and technological base.

The Department's FY 2009 strategies to support HBCUs included DHS's participation in the following key categories, identified by the White House Initiative on HBCUs: Research and Development; Fellowships; Internships; Recruitment; Student Tuition Assistance; and Direct Institutional Subsidies. To support these activities, DHS projected, in the DHS FY 2009 Annual HBCU Plan, a total funding amount of \$9,776,234 to support HBCUs; this projected funding amounted to 16.9% of the total projected spending on Institutions of Higher Education (IHEs). However, DHS exceeded the projected amount by dedicating an actual total funding amount of \$42,543,303 to HBCUs during FY 2009, amounting to 9.8% of total IHE funding. This actual amount awarded to HBCUs constituted a decrease of \$40,230,744 (48.6%) in DHS funding for HBCUs from FY 2008 to FY 2009, while DHS's overall funding to Institutions of Higher Education (IHEs) increased from FY 2008 to FY 2009 by \$230,427,854, for a total IHE funding amount of \$433,066,524. From FY 2008 to FY 2009, DHS decreased HBCU funding for the Facilities and Equipment award category by 45,319,398 (-57.6%).

During FY 2009, DHS did significantly increase funding for the following three categories: Research and Development (R&D); Fellowships, Traineeships, Internships, Recruitment and Intergovernmental Personnel Acts (IPAs); and Student Tuition Assistance. Specifically, in the R&D category, the Directorate of Science and Technology (S&T), University Programs, awarded a total of \$3,269,048 to HBCUs. Under the Fellows and Internships category, six DHS

Components reported a combined total of \$1,348,203 in awards to HBCU students: S&T-University Programs; U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE); Transportation Security Administration (TSA); U.S. Customs and Border Patrol (CBP); U.S. Coast Guard (USCG); and U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (CIS). CBP also awarded \$153,279 to students under the Student Tuition Assistance category.

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### **Research and Development**

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) awarded to the University of the District of Columbia, Washington, DC, a Competitive Training Grants Program which provides students training on legal issues in preparation, response, and recovery. Total Award: \$1,482,511

The Directorate of Science & Technology (S&T), University Programs, continued collaborative partnerships between DHS Centers of Excellence and HBCUs in the following mission areas: Explosives Detection; Mitigation and Response; Social, Behavioral, and Economic Sciences; Risk and Decision Sciences; Human Factors Aspects of Technology; Chemical Threats and Countermeasures; Biological Threats and Countermeasures; Food and Agriculture Security; Transportation Security; Border Security; Immigration Studies; Maritime and Port Security; Infrastructure Protection; Natural Disasters and Related Geophysical Studies; Emergency Preparedness and Response; Communications and Interoperability; and Advanced Data Analysis and Visualization. Participating HBCUs were not identified. Total Award: \$3,269,048

The Transportation Security Administration (TSA) provided two HBCUs – Texas Southern University, TX, and Tougaloo College, MS – with awards to help research and develop initiatives to provide education, training, and public awareness to mass transit employees and management officials. Total Award: \$80,000

### **Training and Technical Assistance**

U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) senior leadership participated in the National Urban League's Black Executive Exchange Program (BEEP).<sup>1</sup> USCIS senior leadership also participated in HBCU outreach activities. Total Award: \$5,500

The U.S. Coast Guard (USCG) provided leadership and professional development training to students at Spelman College, GA. Total Award: \$30,000

The Emergency Management Institute, a component of FEMA, awarded stipends for to 33 senior academic officials from 21 HBCUs. Total Awards: \$9,703

Twelve U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) officials participated as guest lecturers at the following academic institutions: Florida Memorial University, FL; Claflin University, SC; Clark Atlanta University, GA; North Carolina A&T State University, NC; Texas Southern University, TX; Winston-Salem State University, NC; and Johnson C. Smith University, NC. Total Award: \$9,301

ICE also held a Career Day event at North Carolina Central University, NC, College of Criminal Justice. Total Award: \$1,400

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<sup>1</sup> In FY 2007, DHS entered into a Memorandum of Agreement with BEEP, in order to build capacity in the Federal Career Internship program. The objective of DHS' partnership with BEEP is to: develop a cadre of future leaders; share learning experiences across generations; and inspire achievements through committed involvement and operational excellence.

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### **Facilities and Equipment**

FEMA awarded funds to 12 HBCUs for facilities, buildings, and equipment through the Agency's Public Assistance program. Total Award: \$33,332,688

### **Fellowships, Traineeships, Internships, Recruitment and IPAs**

U.S. Customs & Border Protection (CBP) funded three HBCU students – two from Bowie State University, MD, and one from the University of the District of Columbia, Washington, DC – under the Student Career Employment Program (SCEP).<sup>2</sup> Total Award: \$72,895.53

CBP participated in recruitment activities, and funded recruitment advertisements. Total Award: \$7,904.99

USCIS hired five students under the Student Temporary Employment Program (STEP)<sup>3</sup> and three students under the Howard University School of Law Externship Program. Total Award: \$25,801

USCIS also participated in recruitment and outreach activities. Total Award: \$10,000

USCG sponsored four students through the SCEP and STEP programs from the following HBCUs: University of the District of Columbia, DC; Bowie State University, MD; and Elizabeth City State University, NC. Total Award: \$83,310

USCG participated in career fairs at the following HBCUs: Hampton University, VA; North Carolina A&T, NC; Norfolk State University, VA; Delaware State University, DL; South Carolina State University, SC; Allen University, SC; Claflin University, SC; Benedict College, SC; Oakwood College, AL; and Tuskegee University, AL. Total Award: \$5,125

The Federal Law Enforcement Training Center (FLETC) attended a recruitment activity at Bethune Cookman University, FL. Total Award: \$640

ICE awarded internships to 15 students attending HBCUs through the SCEP and STEP programs. These internships provided students direct experience with ICE law enforcement initiatives, and introduced students to the challenges and benefits of Federal law enforcement careers. These students came from several HBCUs, including: Jackson State University, FL; Florida Memorial University, FL; Grambling State University, LA; Morehouse College, GA;

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<sup>2</sup> The Student Career Employment Program provides student interns with work experience directly related to the student's academic program and career goals. Students in the SCEP may be noncompetitively converted to term, career or career-conditional appointments following completion of their academic and work experience requirements.

<sup>3</sup> The Student Temporary Employment Program offers students the opportunity to temporarily work at Federal agencies, and provides maximum flexibility to both students and managers because the nature of the work does not have to be related to the student's academic or career goals.

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Clark Atlanta University, GA; Spelman College, GA; Morgan State University, MD; and Southern University at New Orleans, LA. Total Award: \$394,141

S&T, University Programs, continued their DHS Summer Research Team Program for Minority Serving Institutions, intended to provide research opportunities to increase and enhance the scientific leadership at Minority Serving Institutions in research areas that support the mission and goals of DHS. In addition, this program is designed to engage early career faculty, along with undergraduate and graduate students, in research that will provide them opportunities to understand the mission and research needs of DHS and advance research areas of importance to DHS, while strengthening the talent pool of scientists and engineers. Total Award: \$268,929

TSA established and executed an IPA assignment of a senior-level employee to Tougaloo College, MS, to further TSA's recruitment and awareness campaign. TSA also selected six students from Tougaloo College and North Carolina A&T University to participate in TSA's Career Resident Program, designed to identify and develop college seniors and graduate students with competencies in science, mathematics, engineering or technology, for entry into career development positions at TSA. Total Award: \$329,000

TSA also participated in various recruitment activities, and placed job advertisements with HBCUs and affiliated organizations. Total Award: \$2,817

U.S. Secret Service (USSS) sponsored 12 HBCU students under STEP from the following academic institutions: Albany State University; Bowie University; Coppin State University; Howard University; North Carolina A&T University; and University of Maryland Eastern Shore. Total Award: \$146,140.04

USSS also participated in recruitment activities at various HBCUs. Total Award: \$1,500

### **Student Tuition Assistance, Scholarships and Other Aid**

CBP employed 11 HBCU students, through STEP, from the following HBCUs: Bowie State University, MD; Clark Atlanta University, GA; Coppin State University, MD; Delaware State University, DL; Hampton University, VA; Howard University, DC; Johnson C. Smith University, NC; and University of Maryland Eastern Shore, MD. Total Award: \$153,279.35

USCG awarded funds to HBCUs in the form of tuition and book costs to support the College Student Pre-Commissioning Initiative (CSPI) – a scholarship program designed to enhance the overall diversity of the Coast Guard officer corps. In FY 2009, USCG funded the participation of seven HBCU students in the CSPI program. Total Award: \$54,888

FLETC funded two students from Albany State University, GA, and Bethune Cookman University, FL, under STEP. Total Award: \$9,844

### **Direct Institutional Subsidies**

S&T, University Programs, continued its homeland security scientific leadership program, established to build capacity at Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) in technical fields critical to

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homeland security. The program provides MSIs with funding to support the development of education, research and training activities in homeland security science, technology, engineering, and mathematics areas. Participating HBCUs were not identified. Total Award: \$2,655,460

**Third Party Awards**

USCG funded six HBCU students under the MSIs National Internship program. This program provides college students the opportunity to gain valuable experience in their chosen fields of study. Total Award: \$77,000

ICE placed recruitment advertisements in the “Black College Today” magazine. Total Award: \$3,000

USSS engaged in recruitment activities benefiting HBCUs through third party awards. Total Award: \$21,475
