1. *July 6, Minneapolis Star Tribune* – (Minnesota) **56,000 Xcel customers still without power.** Xcel Energy crews worked July 6 to restore power to nearly 56,000 customers who remained without service after severe storms moved through Minnesota July 5, knocking out electricity to 130,000 customers, delaying flights, closing several roads, and canceling classes at schools across the State.

2. *July 6, NJ.com* – (New Jersey) **6 firefighters hospitalized from warehouse chemical exposure.** A “chemical haze” emitted from a Cyprus Amax Minerals Company warehouse in Carteret, New Jersey injured six firefighters and closed the facility until officials deemed the building safe following a chemical reaction of acrylate monomer June 5. Officials reported that four drums of chemicals will undergo a polymerization process to decontaminate the containers.

3. *July 6, WWL 4 New Orleans* – (Louisiana) **Train derailment closes Press Street in Bywater at St. Claude, other intersections.** Eight New Orleans Public Belt Railroad railcars derailed in Bay Water, Louisiana July 5, prompting officials to close a section of the railroad until the railcars were cleared. No railcars were punctured and no leaks were reported, but officials and HAZMAT units procured air samples as a precaution.

4. *July 6, WKTV 2 Utica* – (New York) **Motorcycle slides into guiderail, kills both riders in the town of Preston.** A fatal motorcycle accident in Preston, New York killed two people and closed County Road 10 for more than 4 hours July 6 while officials investigated the scene of the crash.

5. *July 5, KWCH 12 Hutchinson* – (Kansas) **1 killed when KHP trooper hits 2 vehicles in Ford County.** US-50 in Ford County was closed for several July 5 after a Kansas police officer was forced to swerve and hit two other stopped vehicles while responding to a two-vehicle accident. One person was killed and another was sent to an area hospital.

6. *July 5, KOMO 4 Bellevue* – (Washington) **Semi rollover crash closes Highway 109 near Hoquiam.** Washington officials closed Highway 109 in Hoquiam for several hours July 5 while crews worked to clear the wreckage from a rolled over semi-truck. Officials are investigating the cause of the crash.

Food and Agriculture Sector

7. *July 5, U.S. Food and Drug Administration* – (National) **Mister Cookie Face LLC, a subsidiary of Fieldbrook Foods Corporation, announces a voluntary recall of Sundae Shoppe Ice Cream Dipped Variety Cones for the possible presence of undeclared peanuts.** Mister Cookie Face LLC issued a voluntary recall June 30 for its Sundae Shop Novelty Ice Cream Dipped “Variety” Cones products sold in 32-ounce packages due to mislabeling and undeclared peanuts after it was discovered that the product may contain a Chocolate covered Vanilla ice cream cone with peanut sprinkles in the package, which does not declare the presence of peanuts. No illnesses have been reported and the products were distributed through Aldi Inc., stores nationwide.

8. *July 5, U.S. Department of Labor* – (Texas) **OSHA fines landscaping products manufacturer \$66K for repeat, serious violations after complaints of unsafe working conditions.** The Occupational Safety and Health Administration cited L&M Bag and Supply Company Inc., doing business as L&M Supply Company Inc., with 13 serious, 1 repeat, and 1 other violation July 5 after complaints of unsafe working conditions and the company’s failure to report worker injuries prompted an investigation at the San Marcos, Texas facility which revealed that the company failed to provide emergency shut off buttons on machines, failed to develop and implement a

lockout program, and failed to guard operating machine parts, among other violations. Proposed penalties total \$66,600.

9. *July 5, WECT 6 Wilmington* – (North Carolina) **Estimated 4,000 gallons of sewage spills in Leland.** Approximately 4,000 gallons of untreated wastewater spilled in the Magnolia Greens Community in Leland, North Carolina due to a July 2 electrical malfunction.

10. *July 5, WNYT 13 Albany* – (New York) **5,000 gallons of untreated sewage spill into Saratoga Lake.** Crews worked to clear about 5,000 gallons of untreated sewage that spilled into the Saratoga Lake along Route 9P in Saratoga County, New York after a check valve broke July 4.

11. *July 5, KCRG 9 Cedar Rapids* – (Iowa) **Data potentially breached for 2,500+ patients at Planned Parenthood in Dubuque.** Planned Parenthood of the Heartland announced July 5 that it notified 2,506 patients of a potential data breach after the patients' personal and medical information may have been accessed by unauthorized parties during the April closure and sale of the Dubuque facility. The organization stated that it is conducting a comprehensive analysis of its processes.

12. *July 5, KCRA 3 Sacramento* – (California) **Evacuations lifted for El Dorado County side of wildfire.** Crews reached 60 percent containment July 5 of the 5,595-acre Trailhead Fire burning in El Dorado County. Officials lifted evacuations and road closures in the county.

13. *July 5, Reno Gazette-Journal* – (Nevada) **Massive air attack barely saves Nevada town from fire.** Crews reached 5 percent containment July 5 of a fire that has burned more than 122,000 acres in Elko County, Nevada. Officials estimated that the fire will be contained by July 7.

14. *July 5, WSVN 7 Miami* – (Florida) **22 staffers evacuated from Coconut Creek Police facility after foul odor.** The Coconut Creek Police facility in Florida was evacuated July 5 and staffers were relocated to a building in Sunrise after an unknown odor sent six workers to an area hospital following complaints of headaches and nausea. Crews were unable to determine the source of the odor.

15. *July 5, SecurityWeek* – (International) **Information-collecting Android keyboard tops 50 million installs.** Security researchers from Pentest Limited discovered a third-party keyboard application for Android dubbed “Flash Keyboard” was allegedly seen conducting malicious activity by communication with servers in several countries and sending personal data including the device manufacturer and model number, International Mobile Station Equipment Identity (IEMI), Android version, user email address, mobile networks, and GPS co-ordinates to a remote server. The application engages in deceptive behavior, which Google prohibits.

16. *July 5, Softpedia* – (International) **New malware uses Tor to open backdoor on Mac OS X systems.** Security researchers from Bitdefender discovered a new malware family named Backdoor.MAC.Eleanor on Mac operating system (OS) X can open a backdoor via the Tor hidden service, Hypertext Preprocessor (PHP) Web service, and a Pastebin client. The backdoor can allow cyber criminals to navigate and interact with local fire system, launch reverse shells to execute root commands, and launch and execute several scripts including PHP, PERL, Python, Ruby, Java, and C.

17. *July 6, WDAF 4 Kansas City* – (Kansas) **Residents at KCK apartment complex claim buildings didn't have working smoke alarms at time of fire.** At least a dozen people were displaced from the Rosedale Towers Apartments in Kansas City, Kansas, July 6 following a fire that forced all residents to evacuate and left 12 units damaged. Authorities ruled the fire, which began in a second floor apartment, as accidental.

18. *July 5, KTRK 13 Houston* – (Texas) **Massive fire rips through Humble apartments** A 4-alarm fire at the Deerbrook Forest Apartments in Humble, Texas, July 5 displaced 24 families and prompted the response of over 60 firefighters after the fire reportedly began outside the apartments near a staircase. The exact cause of the fire remains under investigation.

19. *July 4, Salem News* – (Massachusetts) **Four-alarm fire damages Essex business complex.** A business and industrial complex housing 10 businesses in Essex, Massachusetts, sustained major damage July 4 following a 4-alarm fire that prompted the partial closure of Route 22 while firefighters worked to contain the blaze. The extent of the damages remains unknown.
